Guest Speaker at St. Nicholas Day Banquet

The Route 28/E. Ohio Street Project certainly has been difficult for many of us for many, many, many years. Over the years we at PCHF and Preservation Pittsburgh



have worked constructively with the District Executive of PennDOT District 11 who himself came up with some creative ideas. So we have invited Dan Cessna, District Executive of PennDOT, to be PCHF's Guest Speaker since the Rt. 28/E. Ohio Street Project is nearing completion. Our speaker will focus on the positive things we have been able to do together. And they are many, thanks to your support of PCHF.

The Project was re-designed to save about 30 family homes on Troy Hill; to remove about 55 billboards which uglified this Rt. 28 entrance into Pittsburgh; to increase safety on the road by adding a median Jersey barrier; to build the Inter-connector to take Rt. 28 traffic directly around North Side and to the Ft. Duquesne Bridge complex; to design

retaining walls to resemble the stone work in the locks of the Great Pennsylvania Canal which brought immigrants to Allegheny City and Pittsburgh; to restore the safety and historic look of the 31st Street Bridge with its original railings and lights; and to create a quicker and safer access to Rialto Street while eliminating the congestion of the traffic lights at the Bridge intersection. The proposed sterile 60 ft. tall walls with chain link fence on top of them were eliminated, and PennDOT is being sure the hillside will be planted with evergreens and other blooming trees and ground covers to make our City entrance beautiful.

As part of this Project, Dan Cessna assisted building a missing section of the Heritage Trail along the Allegheny River, providing signs that tell the story of the history of the area including St. Nicholas Croatian Church, North Side, Pittsburgh Wool Co., Mala Jaska, etc., and is giving copies of the historic photographs and documents of Mala Jaska to Preservtion Pgh for posterity. of the historic Trail will also incorporate some circa 1826 Canal Stones that had been salvaged from the original canal lock in Allegheny City when the Parkway North was excavated. Dan Cessna and his staff left the area from St. Nicholas to the Penn Brewery as the last part of the Rt. 28/E. Ohio Street Project to be completed in 2014. At the St. Nicholas Day Banquet, Mr. Cessna will discuss

details of how that part of the Rt. 28 Project will look when completed. Also, there will be drawings on display. Be sure to come and listen to the story of how Penn DOT accomplished this difficult task with the help of Preservation Pittsburgh and Preserve Croatian Heritage Foundation.

PCHF TO APPLY FOR PENNSYLVANIA STATE

Preserve Croatian Heritage Foundation will be submitting an application soon to the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission (PHMC) for a historical marker. The marker will specifically identify St. Nicholas Croatian North Side and cement it's place in history for generations to come.

These are the familiar blue and gold markers, which promote Pennsylvania history along the Keystone State's highways and city streets. With over 2,000



markers to date, the program has been around since 1946. A panel of independent experts from across Pennsylvania evaluate each nomination for consideration and are reviewed by PHMC commissioners in the spring.

We at PCHF feel that St Nicholas Croatian Church, North Side, the first Croatian Parish in the Western Hemisphere will meet the criteria needed for approval. St. Nicholas has a rich, unique, and influential history in the Croatian community, not just locally, but statewide, and nationally. Established in 1894, St. Nicholas Church was widely considered to be Pittsburgh's Croatian Cathedral, and was the center of religious and social activity for the Mala Jaska neighborhood.

Costs to pay for and install this marker will be covered by the PCHF treasury, which thanks you for all your past, present, and future donations.

A Saintly, New Overlook of Pittsburgh by Jack Schmitt

The citizens' Pennsylvania Department of Transportation will own all the land along East



Ohio Street from Millvale to the Heinz Plant, and some of that PennDOT property extends to the top of Troy Hill Road above the

site of St. Nicholas Church where PennDOT will

own the sidewalk. From this sidewalk, there is a great Troy HIll view of Downtown Pittsburgh, the river crafts, the Hill District, the Strip District, Mary Immaculate Church in Polish Hill and even Lawrenceville. What a view! The City steps from here to the bottom where the site of St. Nicholas Church, N.S.

will be retained by PennDOT and maintained by the City of Pittsburgh.

PCHF plans to cover the cost of a roadside marker to help Pittsburghers remember forever the location of Saint Nicholas Croatian Church, Mala Jaska and especially the Marohonic Bookstore and Home which was eligible to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In addition, there is discussion about placing about ten sturdy Croatian-type sidewalk benches along the sidewalk between beautiful little trees. This will be an especially accessible place for elderly handicapped people to drive right up to a bench with a view!

This St. Nicholas Overlook would be an attraction that would invite tourists to drive up to Troy Hill for this City view and read the historic markers. Bikers from the Heritage River Trail would bike up to see the view and dine at a local Troy Hill eatery or visit St. Anthony's Chapel (Reliquary), the Firefighters' Memorial, and Voeghtly Cemetery. Bikers and hikers could come up Troy Hill Road,

eat, and go down Rialto Street and join the Heritage River Trail again, making a loop of about two miles.



This St. Nicholas Overlook would also be a nice destination for residents of Troy Hill to walk to in the evenings or daytime to get their exercise and meet other neighbors. A new school that will be in the North Catholic High School building could benefit from such an attraction too. North Side Leadership Conference has offered to prepare a touristy type map of the area including the entrance to Spring Garden-Troy Hill, up Troy Hill Road and a walking route through the neighborhood of Troy Hill including restaurants and cultural-historical sites. An attractive tourist map could be given out at all North Side cultural locations, restaurants, the Chamber of Commerce, and Pittsburgh Tourism Bureau. The St. Nicholas Overlook could be part of the Charm Bracelet places in the North Side to see.

This proposal for a St. Nicholas Overlook could become a "charm" on the charm bracelet of all the wonderful places to visit on North Side.



St. Nick's Church Bells, Blessed Mother Statue and Corner Stone Whereabouts

Recently an announcement came from the North Catholic High School Staff that the outdoor statue of the Blessed Mother from Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto of St. Nicholas Croatian Church, North Side, would be restored and placed in a newly built grotto on the new North Catholic High School grounds. The grotto is being donated by the contractors of the school project. The new high school being built in

Cranberry, Butler County is set to open next year.

Also, the new high school's chapel will house one of the three original bells that were removed from St. Nicholas Church, N.S.'s bell towers, prior to its demolition last year. In the Spring of 1901, three bells were donated to St. Nicholas Church. N.S. by Croatian Lodges. The bells were cast by the Shane Bell Foundry Co. in Baltimore, Maryland.

The first bell is dedicated to both Saints Cyril and



Methodius, brothers. The second bell is dedicated to St. George. The third bell is dedicated to the Blessed Virgin of Trsat. The parishioners were concerned about the welfare of their homeland at the turn of that century. As a prayer and tribute to

their homeland, a special message was cast in the bell. The largest "Sts. inscription reads Cyril and Methodius, pray for the great United Croatia." It is unknown which bell will go to the new North Catholic High School or the future of the remaining two bells.

Joseph Marohnic who owned a bookstore on East Ohio

Street near the Church, sent letters to many of the Croatian lodges throughout the country asking for

contributions towards the purchase of stained glass windows. The response was overwhelming! To date, no information has been given as to the whereabouts of the stained glass windows since they were removed prior to the North Side Church's demolition.

Encouraged by the stained glass windows response, Joseph Marohnic and his committee sent letters to Croatian organizations throughout the United States and Canada requesting donations for the purchase of church bells. Again the response was outstanding. Parishioners from St. Nicholas N.S. Parish donated the remainder of the necessary funds. Instead of having only one or two bells, the parish was able to afford three bells.

Recently, St. Nicholas Millvale Cemetery Committee announced that plans are in process for selecting an area in the St. Nicholas N.S. Cemetery located on Hahn Road for installation of the corner stone from St. Nicholas Church, N.S. Installation

of the corner stone will occur hopefully in the spring of 2014.

We continue to work together


to create a memorial to St. Nicholas Church, N.S.


